To ensure that SMCF's resources continue to help Oregon's most vulnerable populations, in 2013 our Trustees identified specific funding priorities in the following areas;

Health: Healthy Mothers Healthy Children, Oral Health, Overcoming Obesity

Education: Ready for School, Reading Success, Effective Education for All

Environment: River Health, and Environmental Justice

While we are fully engaged with these funding priorities, we remain mindful of our commitment to promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion within the nonprofit, government and tribal communities we support. We are committed to partnering with those organizations that embrace these values and reflect them through their leadership.

In 2013 SMCF partnered with The Chalkboard Project on an unprecedented study of how Oregon's tribal member students are performing in the Oregon Education System. Seven tribal governments participated from across the state. The results identified huge challenges for tribal member students and a pressing need for education support services. While disheartening this study helps us understand the urgent necessity to provide help to these rurally isolated kids. We will join with the Oregon Tribes, the State of Oregon and other funders to increase our commitment to these forgotten students.



Grants Since 1997


